South Shore Yacht Club exceeds 2017 Newport Sea Base fundraiser goals!

Juli King recently announced that with contributions from 22 SSYC members along with 4 community members \$7,460 has been collected for the Newport Sea Base which brings the total donation over 8 years \$51,056!

The 2017 Fundraiser drive will end at the June 9th SSYC Dinner which is the last chance to take advantage of the dinner incentive program: A free dinner for a \$500 Club donation, \$15 off on a dinner for a \$250 Admiral donation, \$10 off on a dinner for a \$150 Commodore donation and \$8 off on a dinner for a \$100 Captain donation. Well, Commodore King and First Dude Brian did it again. They took us out of our comfort level for a raucous four day cruise to the Channel Islands. As Kate Ladd would say, "it was a hellava ride." We spent three nights on the hook, miles from our familiar cruising grounds. This allowed us to experience Channel Islands winds, water conditions and anchoring. Of course our boat, Golden Dragonfly, a 34' catamaran did not have a windless, so John Marshall and myself shared the responsibility of raising the anchor by hand each time we moved. While we practiced our anchoring techniques (successfully I might add), other boats provided us with entertainment as we watched the crews desperately trying to get their anchors to set.

Friday we sailed to the west end of Santa Cruz Island and anchored in Fry's Harbor, a beautiful setting. We used fore and aft anchors there.

Saturday provided a great westerly wind for us to sail down the North side of the island and around the east end to Smuggler's Cove. There we used only the fore anchor and swung with the wind and swells. Julie held a cooking show while preparing a great dinner for everyone that night.



Sunday was our fun day on the island. But to reach land, we had to dinghy to shore. That meant going through the surf. I had never attempted this before. Brian took a video of my first attempt. It was not pretty. We were almost on shore when a wave came up behind us. I thought no problem, but the wave turned us, then tilted us and John and Robin fell out. Fortunately the dinghy did not flip over. Chris Haro helped me push out so I could pick up the rest of our crew. Then I started paying atten-


tion to the wave sets. I picked up Barbara, Kathy and Rose and tried landing again. I approached land behind the crest of a wave with a little more speed so when the following wave hit us we slid into shore, safe! Returning to our boat required timing and team effort to get through the waves and we were successful. This was a great learning experience and a lot of work.

After two days of beautiful sunshine and warmer than expected weather, Monday was overcast. We departed Santa Cruz and headed for Anacapa island. We saw dolphins jumping and we marveled at the island landscape. We decided not to land on Anacapa, we had too much fun Saturday, but primarily we had no more dry clothes. The best part was the light house and the arch at the east end.



Marina Sailing was very accommodating to us, but a boat is a boat and some things don't work, like the VHF radio and no hot water in the galley. Then there was the fresh water holding tank that was leaking, flooding the starboard cabin. We took no showers and bathed in the ocean, rationed water and still ran out of water on the way back to the marina. Boating is not boring.

Ahoy, Mateys!

We survived! Yes, SSYC's first ever cruise to the Channel Islands is officially in the record books. To put the Channel Islands in perspective, it's like Catalina Island with no restaurants, bars, hotels, streets, mooring balls, docks, cell service or facilities of any kind along with more extreme weather, landscape and wild life. In short, it's a true sailor's paradise. So let's expound on these differences. First, without grocery stores, bars or restaurants to supplement your supplies and sundries, we had to weigh down our vessels with enough movable ballast (liquor and food) to sink a container ship and of course we had to consume it all before we returned to port. Then with the threat of potentially extreme weather conditions, most of us walked into the safety gear department at West Marine and let the sales reps have their way with us until we felt adequately prepared for anything that may come our way. Then there's the absence of those handy mooring balls that forced us to put our "rusty" anchoring skills to the test. With rocky cliffs and surf waiting to chew us up and spit out any "fiberglass bucket" that floats its way, spending a little extra time to get our anchor set properly was a must. And now that we've broached to topic of surf, this is a good time to discuss the transition from your anchorage to land without the convenience of a dock to help bridge the gap. Yep, load up the dinghy with sailors and gear, time out the swells, hit the throttle and hope for the best as you approach the beach. If you managed to make it to shore without getting wet you had another chance when it was time to head back to your anchorage, this time motoring or rowing directly into the surf. Needless to say, we all got wet! You may want to check out our new beach landing training video on our website in the News section under Skippers tips. Lol. What a blast!!
